Reflection by Rev'd Susan Taylor

The events of recent times, the war, the flooding; this world of suffering, violence, destruction and disaster raises deep questions of faith for many, myself included.

Violence and destruction are a very real part of human history; of humanity. It's estimated that for only 8% of recorded human history has there been no war. That's a very poor record. So where is God; the God of peace and love? Is God absent in the midst of conflict and darkness? How dare we speak of a God of love in all this?

Well, God is a God of invitation, not compulsion. God invites us to join in a different way of being, one of peace and love, but does not compel us to do so. God does not remove our choice, but bestows on us that very gift. It is our individual and corporate human choice how we use that freedom... how we build it into our lives, our institutions, our religions, our laws and nations. Also, God does not take the side of one nation over another, but does work with us when we use our freedom to work together to create a world which is fair and free and safe.

So does that mean God is merely a bystander in the atrocities of war? In his book *Night*, Ellie Wiesel, the Holocaust survivor, writes about the horrors of Auschwitz. He records a day when all the prisoners were called together and compelled to watch the execution of four people, three men and one young boy, on a crudely constructed gallows. The three men died fairly quickly but the boy took a long time to die. Wiesel writes as they watched the boy struggle from life to death, 'Behind me, I heard a man asking, "Where is God now?" And I heard a voice within me answer him, "Where is He? Here He is. He is hanging here, on this gallows."'

As I think about these words, I think about Jesus on the cross and remember how difficult Jesus' followers found it to reconcile such a death with the possibility of God. The people wanted God to send a warrior who would raise an army to defeat the Romans. They were unimpressed with a carpenter who was gentle and kind and compassionate; and passionate about us loving each other.... but there God was. Jesus, God on earth, did not raise an army of zealots to fight the mighty Roman Empire though their reign was violent and cruel. Instead, Jesus walked among the poor and outcast. Jesus fed the hungry, healed the sick, helped the destitute. He declared the truth of a different way, a new way. He didn't denounce the Romans and ignite war... instead he ignited an ancient and eternal vision of a new world, a peaceful kingdom where there is no more war and no more tears. And Jesus invited his followers to grasp that vision and build it amidst the horrors of occupation.

their lives to give that aid. God in those world leaders seeking to bridge an unbridgeable divide so that the whispers of peace can begin. God is in the doctors and nurses. God's presence is in those on all sides who stand weeping at the grave of parents, siblings and children.

God is here, in the community that offered help and space and assistance in times of flood. God is in the kind words shared. God is in the teachers who went above and beyond to carry children to safety and to keep them safe. STEAM IN HELMINGHAM IN 1935

With your editor's permission, I'd like to share a few photos with your readers which I hope may be of some interest. They show a Garrett steam tractor which was built in 1918 at Leiston, but at the time of the photographs was owned by J.W.&A. Pearl in neighbouring Otley, with the photographs being taken in 1935. At that time, Pearls had a number of engines and threshing machines, and were listed in the 1933 edition of Kelly's Directory for Suffolk as "Threshing machine proprietors, haulage contractors and timber carters distance no object".

The engine shown in the photographs is Garrett 4CD Steam Tractor no. 33295 which was built in May 1918 as part of a large order for the Ministry of Munitions for the war effort. However, the First World War ended before she could see any action with the War Department, and she was auctioned off in the early 1920s, initially to amusement caterer Henry Thurston of Northampton who converted her into a showman's tractor complete with dynamo for powering his fairground rides. He christened the engine "Felix", but she was only with him for a few years, for in 1928 she was purchased by J.W. & A. Pearl and stayed with them until that business was ended due to retirement of John William and Arthur Pearl in 1947. All the showland fittings were removed prior to "Felix" joining Pearls as they were no longer required, although she retained her twisted brasses to the canopy supports, and still does to this day.



With Pearls, “Felix” settled down to a life of threshing and general haulage, we believe as one of four engines that they owned. Certainly when the business closed in 1947, the resulting auction contained four engines, and surprisingly no less than three of them including “Felix” survive to this day.

Current owner Charles Saunders from Warboys in Cambridgeshire has owned the engine since 1987, and has very extensively re-built her over the last few years to be a fine example of the make. Shortly after purchasing her, he managed to make contact with a gentleman by the name of Bob Pratt who gave him copies of the two photographs of his engine which he had taken in 1935. Mr. Pratt was a very knowledgeable man around steam engines, and during the 1930s and 1940s was also a prolific photographer of them, and we are extremely lucky that he took these fine photos of the engine in her working days. The hand written notes on the back of the photograph state that the engine was using its winch to pull logs and a tree stump out of a large pond in Otley.

Very recently however, owner Charles was approached by a gentleman at an event who had seen the photographs in an article that I had compiled on the engine’s restoration for one of the steam preservation magazines, and he told Charles that he recognised the location, and the photos actually depict the engine working in Helmingham and not Otley. As the two villages are so close together, and as the engine states “Otley” on its canopy then this would have been an easy mistake to have made. Incidentally, we are also aware of a “Pearl Farm” on the outskirts of Helmingham, and wondered if this had any family connection to J.W.&A. Pearl of Otley.

During restoration, Charles decided to re-create the appearance of the engine as shown in the photographs, and this has been done as closely as possible. I have attached a further photo as she is now, taken deliberately to re-create the exact pose of the engine in the 1935 photo for comparison. But if we could identify the location in the original photograph then we would love to have the possibility of maybe re-creating the scene today, and that is where we hope your readers might be able to help. We realise that in the intervening 88 years the scene may have changed beyond all recognition, and the building in the background may even no longer exist, but if anyone could shed any light at all on the location of the photograph, or indeed if anyone has any memories of engines working for Pearls, then we would very much like to hear from you. Many thanks in anticipation, and I hope this brief article and the photographs have been of interest.
